## OVERVIEW

Greo is seeking proposals to conduct analyses on high-quality datasets that assess the relationship between gambling involvement and gambling related harm. Proposed analyses should be generalisable to Great Britain. Newer datasets are preferred. Some UK based datasets and documentation are available free of charge from the [UK Data Service](#).

**Preference will be given to research proposals addressing the following priority areas:**

- Conducting the risk curve analyses performed during development of the [Lower Risk Gambling Guidelines](#) in an appropriate dataset to assess their replicability in a population from Great Britain. Those interested in pursuing this should contact Dr. Matthew Young ([matthew@greo.ca](mailto:matthew@greo.ca));
- Gambling and co-occurring health conditions, including substance use and mental and/or physical health;
- Populations experiencing social inequity (e.g., youth, older adults, women, ethnic minorities, low income);
- Reducing harm to individuals, families, and/or communities across the spectrum of gambling risk levels;
- Gaps in treatment service provision; or
- Relationships between gambling forms, co-occurring health conditions, and problem gambling risk levels.

## Deliverables

A summary report will be posted to Greo's website following project completion. The summary report will undergo external peer review and will be posted after revisions have been completed. Copyright remains with the author. A Creative Commons CC-BY-NC-ND will be applied. Authors are encouraged to submit a separate article to an academic journal.

## ELIGIBILITY

This solicitation is open to all researchers with knowledge of gambling in Great Britain. Researchers working in Great Britain, or based elsewhere and partnering with researchers in Great Britain, are preferred. In the case of international partnerships, it is preferred that funding be distributed through a British institution, such as a university, college, research hospital, or not-for-profit organisation in Great Britain (see [Greo's General Funding Policies](#)). Applications from both the public and private sector are welcome.

## VALUE AND DURATION

### Award amount

Two awards will be granted, **valued at up to £17,500 each**, depending on the scale of the project (including all expenses, direct and indirect, and all applicable taxes). Applicants must submit a detailed budget that justifies the proposed project and its costs (see [Greo's Eligible Expenses Guidelines](#)).

### Project Term

The term of the project is six months. Unless otherwise indicated, projects will start on 1 September 2022 and must be completed no later than 28 February 2023.

#### 1 TITLE PAGE

Include the following:

- Name of applicant
- Affiliation
- Study title
- Dataset name
- Identify priority area to be addressed

## **2 ABSTRACT**

Please provide a summary abstract that includes the (1) purpose and significance, (2) rationale, (3) methodology, and (4) potential implications of the proposed research (max. 300 words).

## **3 RESEARCH PROPOSAL**

The research proposal requirements are detailed in the Research Proposal Evaluation chart in the appendix. Please include and subtitle all sections outlined in the chart. The proposal must not exceed three (3) single spaced pages (excluding references and appendices).

## **4 DATA ACCESS AND ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS**

Applicants must obtain research ethics approval, and funding is conditional upon ethics approval being granted.

## **5 BUDGET AND TIMELINE**

Complete the downloadable [budget summary and timeline template](#). Allowable budget expense categories include personnel, equipment, supplies, and travel expenses. Complete the timeline chart (found in the same Excel workbook).

## **6 TEAM CAPACITY AND INFRASTRUCTURE**

Describe the capacity of the team to complete the work proposed as well as how the applicants' institution, organisation, or business is appropriate and will support the research.

## **7 PRINCIPAL INVESTIGATOR'S CURRICULUM VITAE**

Submit the most current version of principal investigator's curriculum vitae.

## **8 APPENDICES (IF APPLICABLE)**

Additional information may be submitted to support the application. Appendices are limited to a maximum of five (5) pages. When including more than one appendix, please combine into a single PDF.
